Helping Baby Animals By Briar Bush Animal Curator, Katie Fisk

"I found a baby bunny, can you take it?"

This is a common phone call we receive as temperatures start to warm and green leaves emerge from their winter buds. Concerned residents will see a baby animal in their yard, seemingly abandoned, and want to help. Even though Briar Bush is not a licensed wildlife rehabilitator and we are unable to accept injured and orphaned wild animals, we are still here to answer your questions. Plus, the great news is that in most cases, intervention is not necessary! Learning a little bit more about the childhood of wild animals can help us know when an animal needs help and when it is just going through growing pains.

Rabbits




Rabbits are known for their prolific breeding habits: have a litter of bunnies, get them weaned, then have another. This means that rabbits reach independence at a very young age and small size. A rabbit the size of your palm, or 2/3 the length of a dollar bill, is already completely independent! But what if you find a nest of bunnies without a parent

around? Mother rabbits will leave their babies hidden and warm in their nest, usually a depression of grasses and fur on the ground, while they are out eating. This way the mother is not drawing attention to her helpless babies. She will return twice a day to nurse the babies, usually at dawn and dusk.

Birds

We've all seen those scraggly, awkward, baby birds in spring, calling for their parents and generally looking all-around confused. They flap and flutter, and don't get very far. It is certainly a logical conclusion that this bird may need help. Human babies and toddlers don't...

immediately walk perfectly, and running takes even more practice; birds need practice in order to become masters of the air. In the meantime, they stay close to the ground and wait for their dutiful parents to come and feed them. If you watch a baby bird, you shouldn't have to wait more than 30 minutes to see a parent bring it food. What if a featherless baby bird falls out of a nest? If you can find the nest, place it back in. It is a myth that the parents will abandon it because of human scent.

Squirrels

Baby squirrels are like the ultimate spoiled children when they are being weaned. They are used to being waited on hand and foot, safe in a nest, fed warm milk whenever they are hungry, and then they are cast out into the cold, scary world to figure things out on their own. The surprising behavior that results is these youngsters seem to have no fear of humans whatsoever, approaching them and sometimes even climbing right up pants legs! It's like the young squirrel is saying, "You gotta help me! Mom cut me off and I'm hungry!" This phase is short-lived, however, and the squirrel quickly moves on to raiding bird feeders.



So, what are some signs that an animal truly needs help?

If you see any of these signs, reach out to a licensed rehabilitator like Philadelphia Metro Wildlife Clinic, AARK, or the Schuylkill Center Wildlife Clinic:

- --The animal is bleeding
- -- The animal has flies on it
- --A baby bird without all of its feathers and you don't know where the nest is
- --An adult animal that lets you approach close enough to touch it (but please do not touch!)

Knowing more about the development stages of animals helps us know when we should intervene and when we should not. It can be the difference between getting an animal in need help and committing an unintentional kidnapping. And even though Briar Bush is not a licensed rehabilitator, we will always be here to answer your questions!
